Winner of 2016 Cannes Film Festival's Un Certain Regard Jury Prize Harmonium (淵に立つ) Directed by Koji Fukuda (118mins, 2016) Wednesday, September 13 @7PM (<u>JFLA Auditorium</u>) In Japanese with English subtitle

Director, Koji Fukada's latest film uses themes of Japanese domesticity to investigate the surrounding fissures that expand to collapse a family shaken by tragedy.

With his wife Akie (Mariko Tsutsui), Toshio (Kanji Furutachi) runs a machinery workshop in the garage attached to their family home. When Toshio hires an old acquaintance, recently released inmate Yazaka (Tadanobu Asano), the couple's quiet routine is disrupted and unspoken conflicts rise to the surface. Yazaka ultimately earns favor with Akie after offering to help their daughter prepare for a harmonium recital but, as the repetition of the metronome and the discordant harmonium resound, tragedy strikes.

Fukada's measured psychological thriller elevates the genre to profound dimensions, shrewdly navigating themes of morality, guilt and atonement to illustrate the inherent solitude that separates us from those to whom we presumably feel closest. (Malin Kan)

The first talk will introduce the indigenous religion of Shinto and the deities within; the following four will look at Buddhist deities from four distinct classes: buddhas, bodhisattvas, wisdom kings, and celestial beings.



11-year-old Tomo (Rinka Kakihara) lives with mother Hiromi (Mimura), but Hiromi decides to give up on her and leaves their home. Tomo, now all alone, visits her uncle Makio's (Kenta Kiritani) home. Makio lives with his beautiful girlfriend Rinko (Toma Ikuta). Rinko was born as a man and now works as a caregiver at a home for the elderly. Tomo is a little confused by the situation, but they begin to live as a family.

Director, Naoko Ogigami has defined her own distinct voice with several maverick features centered on women (Kamome Diner, Glasses, Rent-a-Cat). Utilizing an amusingly quirky and often bittersweet mode of storytelling, she creates unique spaces that offer a respite from the irritations of daily life to both her characters and viewers. This film finds her taking things to a new level, incorporating a transgender character, presented in a decidedly objective and novel form

J-LEAP (Japanese Language Education Assistant Program) 2017-19 Cycle: EIGHT Young Native Japanese Language Teachers to be Dispatched to the United States

The Japan Foundation has dispatched eight native Japanese Assistant Teachers (ATs) to K-12 institutions in cities across the United States which offer Japanese language courses. The Japanese Language Education Assistant Program (J-LEAP) program will allow these ATs to reside and teach in their respective cities for two years until the end of July, 2019.

J-LEAP, now in its seventh year, is a program that was launched by the Japan Foundation in 2011 as part of an initiative to strengthen U.S.-Japan exchange programs for young people. ATs are brought to the U.S. to "team teach" in Japanese language classrooms with Lead Teachers (LTs) for a maximum of two years. J-LEAP was proposed during the Japan-U.S. summit in November 2010 between former Prime Minister Naoto Kan and President Barack Obama.

Upon arriving in Seattle, WA on July 26th, the eight ATs participated in a five-day orientation and training session until July 30th after which they departed for their respective host institutions. During the orientation, the ATs were joined by their respective LTs as well as the twelve AT/LT pairs from the previous year.

Starting in October, we will be publishing reports from two ATs every month in Breeze so please be sure to check back and read about these J-LEAPers' experiences!
